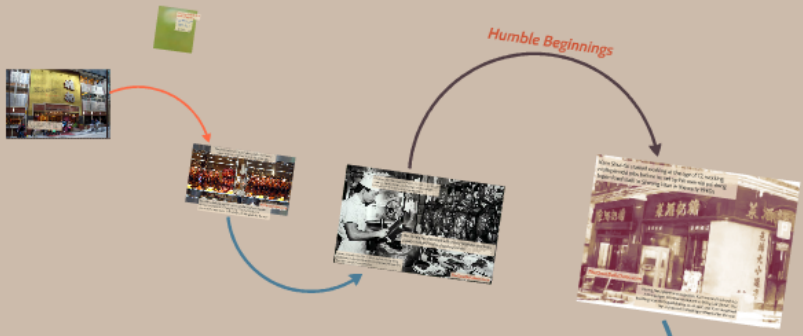

**Kam Shui-Fai's roast goose restaurant
Yung Kee, founded in Hong Kong in
1942 with about USD\$500 in savings**

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At the end of 2013, Yung Kee Holdings has HK\$888 million (approx. USD\$ 115million) in cash and the restaurant is estimated to be worth HK\$1.3 billion (approx. USD \$167.5 million).

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Yung Kee sold roast goose dishes with rice from a street stall for a just for 5 cents 70 years ago,

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this skilful delicacy by Kam was transformed into a world famous restaurant in Hong Kong's Central district so successful it won a star in Michelin's 2009 guide for the city

Kam Shui-fai started working at the age of 12, working multiple odd jobs before he set up his own dai pai dong (open food stall) in Sheung Wan in the early 1940s



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During the Japanese occupation, Kam moved his business into a proper Chinese restaurant in Wing Lok Street. The building was destroyed during an air raid, and Kam reopened the restaurant in Pottinger Street after the war.

The Miele Guide is an authoritative guide to Asia's best restaurants published annually since 2008. It features 450 restaurants across Asian countries. A jury of region's top restaurant critics, food professionals and prominent food lovers cast their votes to confirm the ranking of Asia's Top 20 every year.

In 1968, Yung Kee shot to international fame when Fortune magazine named it one of the world's 15 best restaurants, the only Chinese restaurant on in the list

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Its signature dish soon earned the nickname “flying roast goose” after tourists started bringing the dish back to their home countries via takeaway packs on board their planes.



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The trend led to collaboration with Cathay Pacific Airlines to serve the delicacy to its first and business class passengers.
