Oil Crisis in 1973

Followed by the oil crisis, it brought much optimism to depend less on oil and more on nuclear energy. There were advances in microcircuitry and semiconductors and this led to new growth in consumer electronics. There was an increase in energy efficiency of manufacturing. The service industries expanded in an increasingly postindustrial economy.
