#### Euphemism? what's that?

It's simply a nicer way to say something, or a substitution to avoid unpleasant or offensive expressions.



Orwell notes that politician us euphemisms often when giving speeches, one example is "While freely conceding that the Soviet regime exhibits certain features which the humanitarian may be inclined to deplore, we must, I think, agree that a certain curtailment of the right to political opposition is an unavoidable concomitant of transitional periods, and that the rigors which the Russian people have been called upon to undergo have been amply justified in the sphere of concrete achievement." instead of saying "I believe in killing off your opponents when you can get good results by doing so."

Instead of saying "someone died", the euphemism "they passed away," is used as a replacement

#### Does Parody sound familiar?

A humorous or satirical imitation of a serious piece of literature or writing

Orwell uses the example of, "Objective considerations of contemporary phenomena compel the conclusion that success or failure in competitive activities exhibits no tendency to be commensurate with innate capacity, but that a considerable element of the unpredictable must invariably be taken into account." as a parody.

#### Idioms, what about 'em?

An expression whose meaning is not predictable from the usual meaning of what is actually being said.

Idioms are tools used to save the mental effort of the reader and the writer

the idiom, "Cool as a cucumber" is used (mostly by previous generation's) to say that someone is calm.

# What in the world is Archaic Language? (archaism)

Using words that no one will even recognize or are outdated to modern speaking and writing styles. Generally only words that will score big points in scrabble

Orwell defines archaism as "salvaging of obsolete words and turns of speech,"

words like "hither," betwixt," "thee, thy", and "commence".
