Caleb is a particularly frustrating student. He frequently annoys his classmates by tapping his pencil, making obnoxious noises, and tattling on his classmates for even the smallest misdeed. He also has a history of not paying attention while instructions are being given. While Ms. S is handing out materials for an assignment one afternoon, Caleb realizes that he has no idea what the assignment is, so he repeatedly asks her to repeat the instructions, his volume increasing with each request. His classmates, tired of his constant lack of attention, begin to ridicule Caleb. Ms. S realizes she has two choices: ignore all of the students and hope the teasing will teach Caleb to stop harassing the other students and to pay better attention, or put a stop to the emotional bullying.


She chooses to walk back to the front of the classroom and gain the students' attention. "Class, I feel it is time we visit our classroom rules again, as it seems they have slipped our minds." She then addresses all of the classroom rules, going into more detail on "pay attention to the teacher" and "speak kindly to each other at all times," without singling out students who were bullying or not paying attention. She then goes over the instructions for the assignment again, cautioning that this would be the final time, and finishes handing out her classroom materials.
