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## Focus on Literary Forms

- parody: a comic piece of writing that mocks the characteristics of a literary form, a specific work, or the style of a certain writer.
- satire: writing that ridicules the faults of individuals, groups, institutions, or humanity in general
- To analyze cause and effect, look for words and phrases such as subsequently and resulted in that signal those relationships
- tone: attitude toward the subject matter or reader
- purpose: to inform, persuade, tell a story, convey a sense of place, or to analyze an idea
- essay: a brief nonfiction work about a specific subject
- formal essay: analyzes public issues or philosophical topics in a serious tone
- informal essay: explores everyday topics in a casual, conversational way
- persuasive essay: convinces readers to accept his or her opinion or take a course of action
- descriptive essay: uses sensory details to present a portrait of a person, place, or thing
- expository essay: the writer explains an issue or process
- satirical essay: uses irony, ridicule, sarcasm, or a parody to comment on a topic

## Background of Essay

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Parody- a comic piece of writing that mocks the characteristics of a literary form, specific work, or the style of a certain writer.
