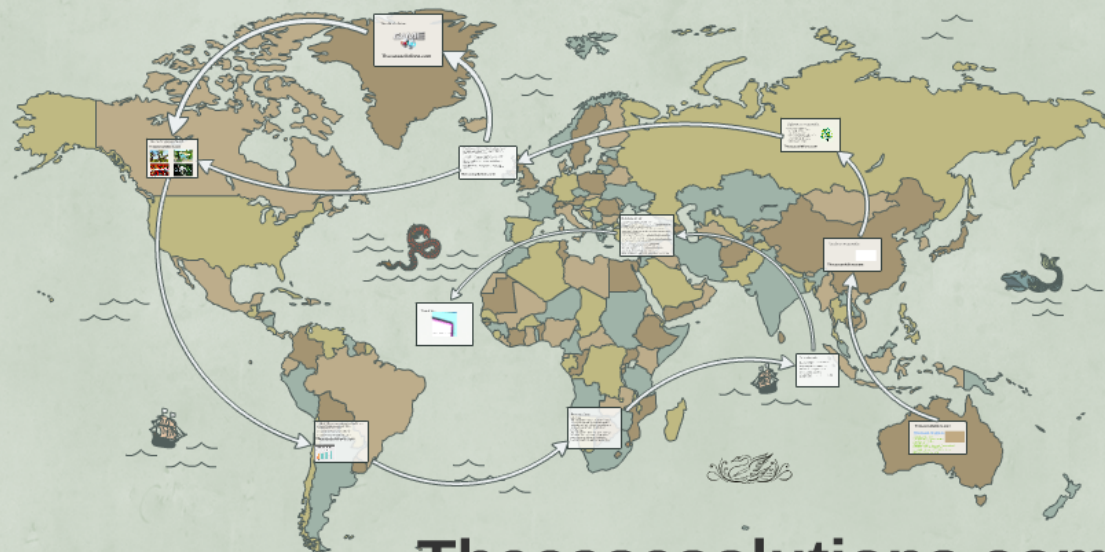
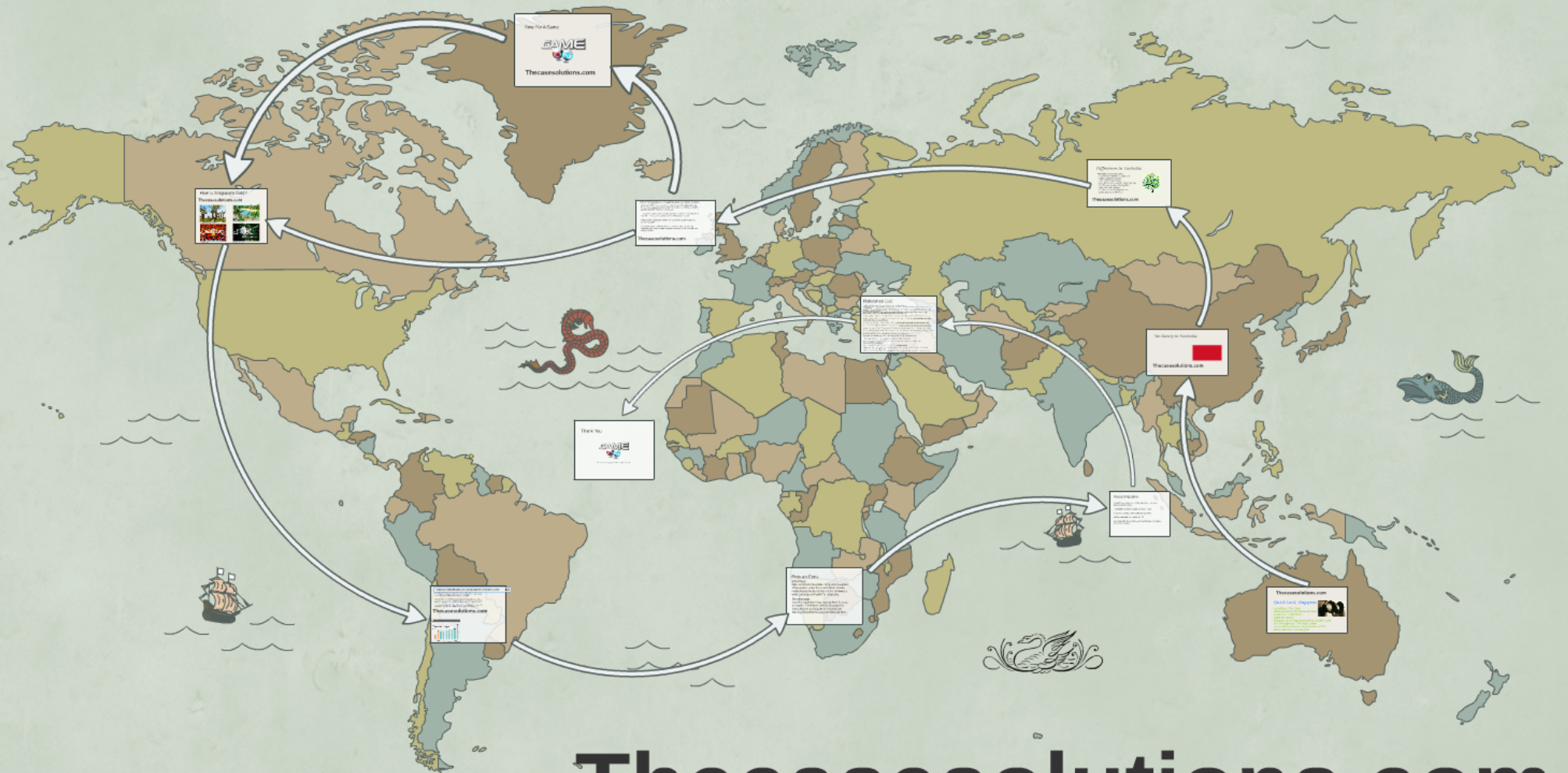

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How Singapore's healthcare system works

Singapore's Healthcare system works in classes. from **Class C** being the lowest, to **Class A** being the highest. the more comfort and control a patient wants the more they have to pay.

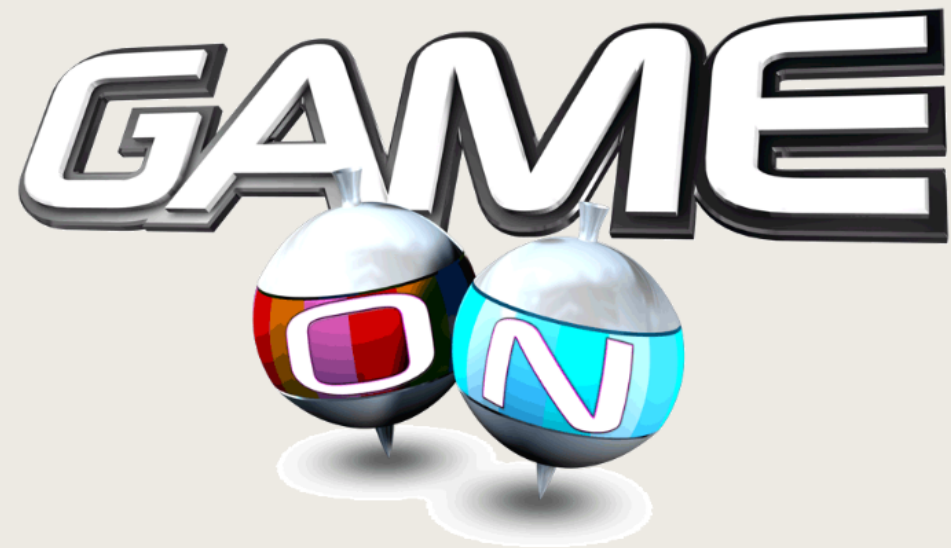
The government provides subsidy of 65-80% to Class C and 50-65% of Class B the rest can be paid through their Medisave account

If the cost for health becomes too much a program called MediShield comes into action.

Political Influences on Singapore's health care.

Singapore Government is a republic with a parliamentary system of government. Due to the governments laws towards health and health orientation its population enjoys having the highest health and nutrition in all of Asia.

The government has put in place incentives that challenge company's to find solutions to improve Singapore health care system to better the people, aisa and beyond. this incentive is called HWPO (Health and wellness Programme office)
