As with other medical doctors, prospective cardiologists begin their education path by completing at least three years of coursework in undergraduate school with a focus on the basic sciences. They then go on to complete four years of medical school. During medical school, students typically spend the first two years taking classes to learn medical and physiology. Courses may include cell biology, genetics and immunology. In the final two years, students complete clerkships, diagnosing illnesses and treating patients in clinics.

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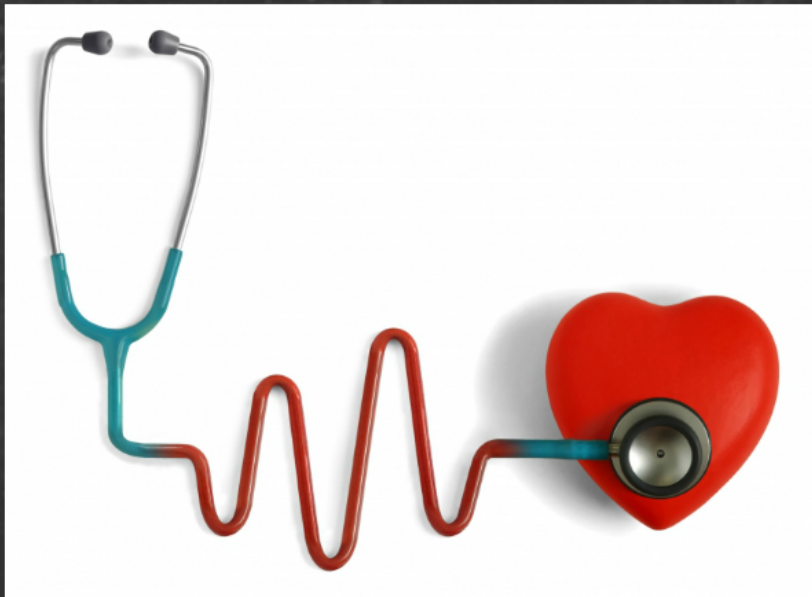
