

The Social Class in Lower Canada was prevented from having good land and they often had to work for the Upper Class.

# Important People

Robert Gouley was a reformer who immigrated from Scotland and wanted to bring poor people from Britain to Upper Canada to farm. He is a moderate.

William Lyon Mackenzie was also a reformer from Scotland who used his newspaper to speak out the problems experienced by farmers and the Family Compact. He was considered a radical.

Sir Francis Bond Head was appointed lieutenant-governor of Upper Canada and was welcomed by the reformers.



# What created the need for government reform in Upper and Lower Canada?

The poorer people wanted reform because most of the land in Northern Canada was owned by the rich and sold at high prices. They created there own party, ran for government (to reform), and won. The problems were the land speculators, rigged voting, and the government favoring the rich.
