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What is Community Ophthalmology?

- Branch of medicine created in 1978
- Hospitals failed to provide preventive services to populations at risk of eye disease, leaving them to become blind due to preventable causes[1]
- Promotes eye health and prevention of visual impairment/blindness through programs

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Visual Function

Low Vision

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There are 4 levels of visual function:

- 1. Normal vision
- 2. Moderate visual impairment
- 3. Severe visual impairment
- 4. Blindness

Visual impairment includes both low vision & blindness



- A significant reduction in vision that cannot be corrected with medical glasses or contact lenses and reduces a person's ability to function at certain tasks[2]
- Visual acuity is 20/70 or poorer in the betterseeing eye



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Visual acuity of less than 3/60, or a corresponding visual field loss to less than 10°, in the better eye with the best possible correction[3]
