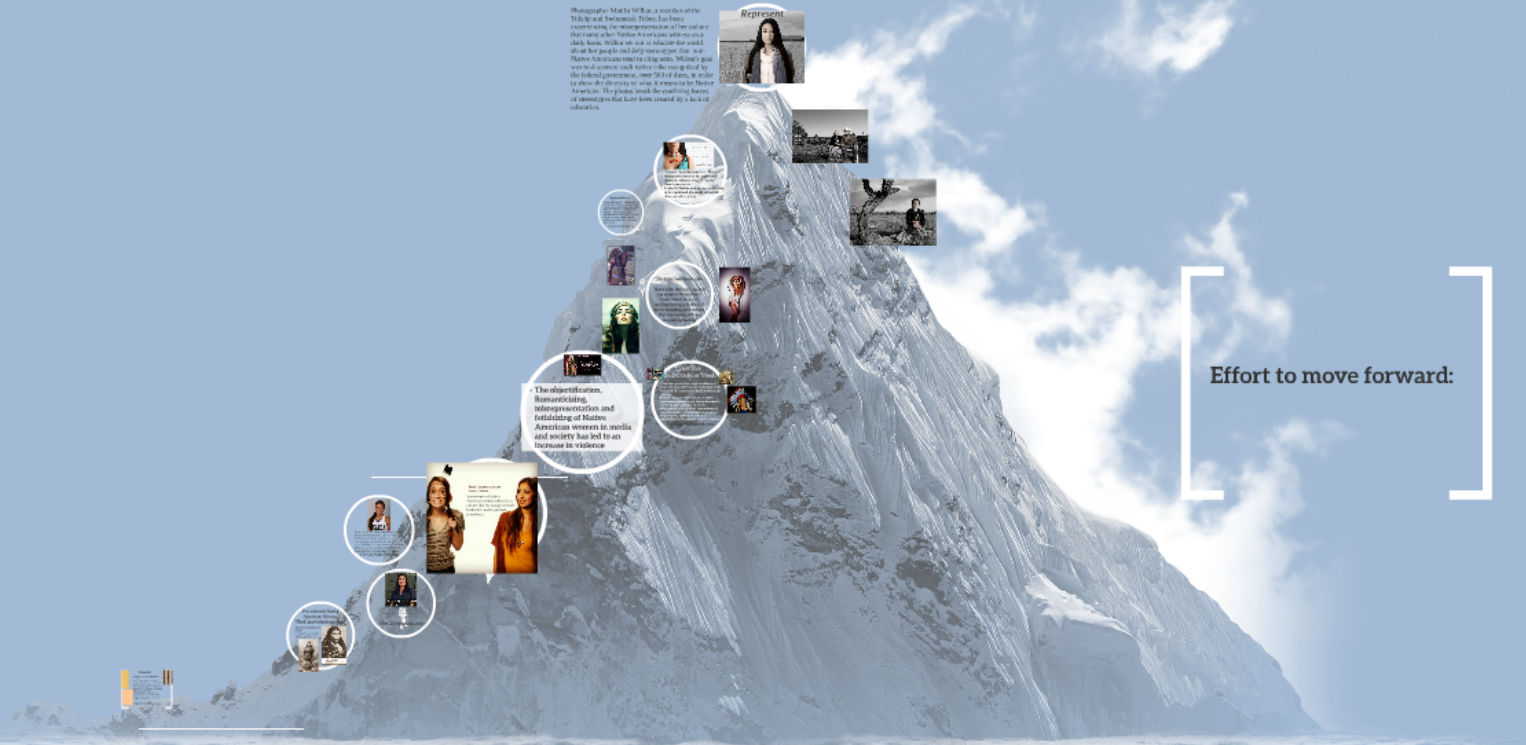


Planned Parenthood Federation of America in 2008

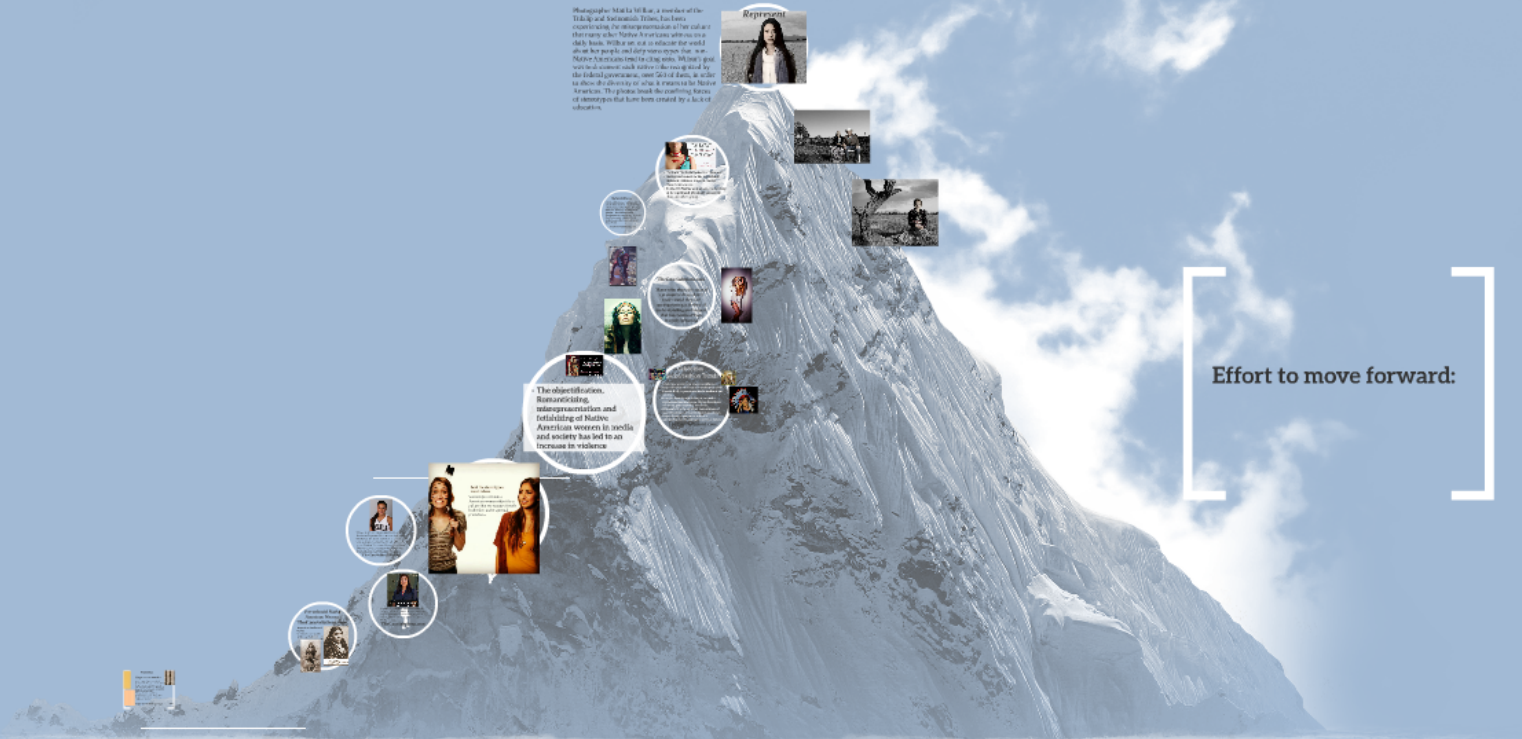

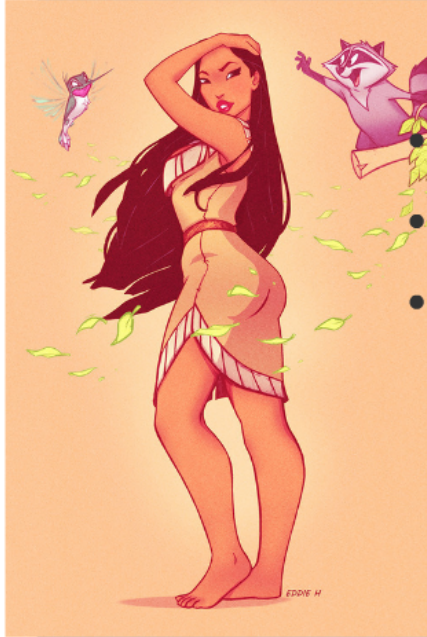


Effort to move forward:

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Pocahontas

- Many are aware of the romanticized version
- commercialized and commodified
- Discrepancies between the fictional Walt Disney character and the woman who had been formerly known as Pocahontas
- Rebecca Rolfe (Pocahontas) was a living tribute to colonial society
- Changed her name and lifestyle
- Participated in first interracial marriage
- Propagated assimilation to encourage settlement in America

Diane Humetewa has been named the first Native American woman to serve as a U.S. federal judge.

Humetewa, a member of the Hopi tribe of Arizona, is the first native Native American woman to serve as a federal judge and the third Native American to serve on a federal bench.

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Tahnee Robinson, an enrolled member of the Northern Cheyenne Tribe, was drafted by the WNBA as the first entirely Native American woman in professional basketball. Robinson is also Eastern Shoshone, Pawnee, and Sioux. She was born and raised on the Wind River Reservation in Fort Washakie, Wyoming.

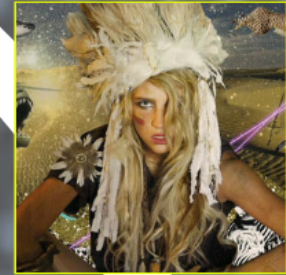
- The trend known as "going native" is a harmful and due to romanticizing what it means to be Native American
- Mindset: Taking on an indigenous identity = fun and interesting, Decolonization= painful and difficult
- in extreme cases: cultural fraud (taking away jobs from real Native Americans)
