


The American Cancer Society is a nationwide voluntary health organization dedicated to eliminating cancer

How did it all start?

The American Cancer Society was found in 1913 by 15 physicians and a businessman, John D. Rockefeller in New York City. Back in that time in history it was not considered appropriate to mention the word 'cancer' in public. So many patients didn't want to know that they have cancer and wouldn't even announce it to their families.



GOOD DEEDS:

Runs public health advertising campaigns, and organizes projects such as the Relay For Life and the Great American Smokeout. It operates a series of thrift stores to raise money for its operations. The ACS participates in the Hopkins 4K for Cancer, a 4000-mile bike ride from Baltimore to San Francisco to raise money for the society's Hope Lodge.

Relay For Life is a team fundraising event where team members take turns walking around a track or designated path. Each event is 6-24 hours in length and each team is asked to have a member on the track at all times to signify that cancer never sleeps. DetermiNation is a halfmarathon or a marathon and it's your personal race.
