  - With this further education she could have went on to become a doctor but quoted "I never wanted to be an M.D. because I could do it I would be in nursing, which is a real profession."

Korean War  
1950-1953

- June 25, 1950 the North Koreans (soon attacked and trapped) the Republic of Korea (South Korea) beginning the Korean War.
- The American Military helped the ROC last the North Koreans continued to advance until the Americans launched a major attack on September 15, 1950.
- The attack was led by General Douglas MacArthur and resulted in the advancement of the United States and American forces toward the Yalu River.
- A Chinese sneak attack, then a nuclear war occurred and the negotiations began.
- Finally, on June 27, 1953, an agreement was signed, ending the war.
- Around a million Chinese were killed or wounded, 3 million Koreans died, and the American death toll was 20 thousand.



- Abdullah spent 40 years in the military as a member of the Governmental Corps of Upper Sumer (after through Sumer)
- He entirely worked in the Sumer in the 1920-1934
- He was the first sultan officer to achieve the highest rank after the National
- He was also the first sultan as well as the first sultan to be named Deputy Sultans General

### Key contributions

- In 1897, she directed the first team to what became the ground work for Progressive Patient Care.
- Progressive Patient Care was a three step process where a patient of critical condition would first be sent to intensive care, followed by intermediate care, and finally home care.

- **1905 was the first time that home care was introduced.**

As a result,

1. Progressive Patient Care started the three divisions, ICU, Intermediate care, and Home care. There is now more organization for placement of patients based on their condition and immediate needs.
2. Home care treatment now allows patients to feel more comfortable at home. It also allows the patients to regain their independent function with the aid of nurses.

What does science have to do with nursing?

- Alkhalaf believed that nursing should be research and evidence based
- In 1990, she helped set up the first nurse-orientated graduate nursing program

*As a result,*

- 2 His science-based approach allowed growth port (as test) back care. She believed that research and experience were important in the science of patient care.

As a result...

1. There is now a specialized word for patients who have cardiac conditions such as heart attacks.
2. The development of DRG assigned patients into certain groups based on specific needs and costs. Many insurance and health care providers use DRG including Medicare.

- more emphasis on establishing common language, e.g., in the ILSB, in the TIGSS
- *and* increased awareness of public health benefits and risks of having *in vivo* or *in vitro* or *in silico* data shared to address the disease, the data shared confidentially and securely



## As a result,

- 3 The introduction of safety and health issues into the morning business meeting is a partial result of AIDS that influences.
- 4 The increasing incidence of drug, alcohol, and/or a diet, stress, has affected company morale and by impacting the safety, and hence, cost and quality of work given to the client.
- 5 The increased public awareness society is giving related health issues and diseases has increased.

- Abdallah developed FACE (Patient Assessment of Care Evaluation), a system that measures the quality of health care based on patient satisfaction in the facility.

As a result...

- 1 PACE allows patients' needs to be acknowledged which renders the care given to them. This changed the nursing theory from disease-centered to patient-centered. It is still used as standards in the United States.
- 2 It helped form the foundation for future classification systems and was used up until the 21st century.
