Apportionment is the process of dividing the 435 memberships, or seats in the U.S. House of Representatives among the 50 states.

# Apportionment

The apportionment population would consist of the residents population of the 50 states plus overseas federal employees (military and civilian) and thier dependents living with them. The popluation of the District of Columbia is excluded from the apportionment population because it does not have any voting seats in the U.S. House of Reps.

# Hill Method

Joseph A. Hill Created the hill method in 1911 he was the Chief Statisician of the U.S. Census Bureau.

The Hill Method is the current method used to apportion U.S. House.

Also is known as the Method of Equal Proportions.

## Huntington Hill Method

Joseph Hill idea was to keep the ratio of one state to that of another as close to 1 as possible. He said to choose the size of the House of Rep. and then assign seats to the states so that no transfer of a seat can reduce the percentage difference in representation between those states.
