




The Need

In 2009, Memphis had:

- The highest urban poverty rate in the U.S. (26%) and a 40% child poverty rate
- One of the highest urban unemployment rates in the U.S. (11.7%)
- More than 30,000 students over-age for grade
- Only 4% of MCS students graduating college-ready



Tennessee, Delaware schools to get Race to the Top funds

Education Secretary Arne Duncan says two states will get education funds under the "Race to the Top" program.

Washington (CNN) -- Tennessee and Delaware were the only two states designated Monday to receive funds in the first round of the education funding competition "Race to the Top," federal officials announced.

Delaware will receive \$100 million under the program, while Tennessee will receive \$500 million.

Tennessee becomes one of the first states to receive Race to the Top funding in support of teacher effectiveness work.
